#### 1. Status and Nature of Activities

The Rotary Club of Truro (the "Organization") is a member of Rotary International, established to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprises. The Organization is a not-for-profit organization which operates the Community and Club Accounts.

The Rotary Club of Truro Charitable Trust (the "Trust") is a registered charity under the *Income Tax Act* (*Canada*) and is exempt from income taxes under section 149(1)(d) of the *Canadian Income Tax Act*.

#### 2. Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and include the following significant accounting policies:

#### Fund Accounting

The Organization uses fund accounting and accordingly, separate statements of revenue and expenses and separate statements of financial position are prepared for the Club Account and the Community Account.

The Club Account accounts for the Organization's administrative and social activities.

The Community Account accounts for the Organization's fundraising activities. This fund reports the monies which are available to provide support to the community.

#### Revenue Recognition

The Organization and the Trust follow the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection reasonably assured.

#### **Contributed Goods and Services**

Goods and services are contributed to the Organization and the Trust each year. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair value, contributed goods and services are not recognized in the financial statements.

#### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash includes cash on hand and balances with banks.

#### Investments

Investments consist of guaranteed investment certificates which are carried at cost plus accrued interest, which approximates fair value.

## 2. Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

## Measurement Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting year. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty. The effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be material and would be accounted for in the period the change occurs.

## Financial Instruments

The Organization and the Trust initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value, then subsequently measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, receivables and investments.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include payables and accruals.

### 3. Financial Risks

### Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge its obligation. The Organization's main credit risks relate to its receivables. The Organization provided credit to its customers in the normal course of its operations.

### Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of the changes in market interest rates. The Organization holds guaranteed investment certificates that are subject to fluctuations in interest rates.

### Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Organization is exposed to this risk mainly in respect to its payables.

During the year, the directors approved a transfer of \$9,400 from the Club account to the Community account. This represents 66.67% of \$14,100, the district conference surplus realized by the Club in the 2016 fiscal year.

<u>Social:</u> The Social Committee, chaired by Judy Nicholson, organized a number of fun events including Summer Social, Christmas party, as well as Social Thursdays from 5-6 at Sherlock's once per month. A Sleigh ride at Hamilton's was a new endeavour, and was a wonderful way to meet the Hrez family from Syria that we helped sponsor.

<u>Constitution and By-Laws</u>: Wayne Gillis is working with Patterson Law office to clean up our Constitution and By-Laws. The transfer of the Christmas Index to the Rotary Club of Truro has made this especially necessary.

<u>Publicity:</u> You may have thought Chair Alana Hirtle was running for political office with the number of times we saw Rotary in the newspaper the past year ;) Great work to get Rotary in the public eye. It definitely helps for our fundraising campaigns and in looking for new members.

Attendance/Meetings/Bulletin/IT: An Ad Hoc Committee consisting of Adam Wyllie and Wayne Gillis met with the BWG to discuss ways to control meeting cost deficits. Guaranteed numbers were lowered from 35 to 25, measures to reduce food wastage were implemented, and it was recognized that continuing to meet consistently in the summer would be advantageous for fellowship, and continuity of committee work. A few changes were made to Meeting programs this year. We are keeping attendance numbers private and enjoying the camaraderie of the people who attend the meetings. In order to raise more money for the Foodbank, Happy Mug contributions were raised to \$2. Jim Goit continues to produce a wonderful bulletin each week that keeps us informed of meeting minutes and upcoming events in Club, District and Rotary International. Some goals included:


- monitoring the "buddy system".

## Rotary Club of Truro Youth Services Committee Report 2016-2017

As Chair of the Youth Services Committee I am pleased with the year we had considering that this year the teachers "Work to Rule" situation proved challenging to get the word out on three main activities in youth services.

*Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)* was held on May 5 – 9am – 2pm - spearheaded By Stephen Gallant. The event had 37 students in attendance with students attending from each of the 5 large regional high schools. The one day event was held at the Truro NSCC campus. This year we also had 2 students attending from the Halifax district to participate in the day and will be taking feedback to the Rotary clubs there. Winners of the two \$500 bursaries were Joecy Peters, a 17 year old student from CEC, as well as Lindsey Burgess, also a 17 year old student from CEC.

Out of the 37 students, 17 were prepared for their interview with a personal portfolio. A special thanks to Jim Gould and Ken MacDonald who were tasked with the job of reviewing all the portfolios and holding the interviews. This year we tried to get the portfolios in in advance of the RYLA day, but had limited success. With 17 students providing portfolios, we are challenged with reviewing the portfolios and interviews within the time allotted for the day. The day consisted of many activities for the students to participate in as well as a chance to each group to produce a 5 minute video on the challenges and advice they would provide to students entering high school. Most of the videos focused on time management and were posted to the Rotary website. Also this year we provided the students with a binder that they could use as a personal portfolio that they could use in the future. This resulted in an increased cost for the RYLA day, but provided a great take-away for the students.

Adventures in Citizenship - Barb Goit looked after activity. Each year the Rotary Club of Truro selects a student to send to this experience in Ottawa. Registration and flight expenses are covered by the Truro Club. Students are billeted. Participants have the opportunity to win a \$1,000 scholarship to a post secondary institution of their choosing. On March 24, at the offices of CIBC Wood Gundy Interviewers Ryan Beazley, Barb Goit & Adam Wyllie met with 3 high school students. All candidates were strong. The winner was Emma Toole and we provided sponsorship for her to attend the Rotary Adventure in Citizenship program in Ottawa, May 1-4.

*Interact* club at CEC- Laurie and Lydia co-ordinated with the interact clubs. SCA was a no–go this year but, will have a fresh start next year. On May 20th, 10am-2pm in the CEC foyer the CEC Interact held a silent auction and art show with all proceeds going to Maggie's Place. Adam Wyllie and other Rotarians stopped by and supported their efforts.

## Rotary Foundation 2016-2017

The Rotary Club of Truro supports the work of the Rotary Foundation through the donations of members and the fundraising efforts of the Club. The Rotary Foundation is the source of funding for all the worthwhile projects and programs that Rotary operates.

- Rotary International requests club target \$100US per member each year to the Annual fund. In 2016-17 members of the Club donated an average of \$56 per member. The average for all members in the District was \$81.
- The Club has 15 members who contributed a minimum of \$25 US every year to meet the Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) Status. Eleven members of the club contributed more than \$100 US during 2016-17 to become Sustaining members.
- The Club and its members contributed a total of \$5,273 to the Polio Plus Campaign. This was the 4<sup>th</sup> largest ٠ contribution of any club in the District. This was an improvement from \$1,091 and 18<sup>th</sup> place in the previous year.

# Program Report for Christmas Index Program 2016

2016 was the third year that Rotary hosted the Christmas Index Program. Each year the Club "learns" more about the internal running of the program. The Program normally runs from mid-October to mid-January of the following year. A coordinator is hired to manage the program office activities under the guidance of the Index Board. The Rotary Club and the Index Board displayed great participation in all the volunteer activities: distribution centre (two week period), packing day, distribution day, and the final re-boxing the remaining gifts. Distribution Centre assisted 100 + families that did not have sponsors from the community. Also, this year the Foodbank assisted over 400 clients in cooperation with the Distribution Centre. Index office moved to 28 Esplanade to be closer the regular venue for the distribution centre.
